


In 2002 as the Council Working Group on WSIS (CWG-WSIS) under Resolution 1196, the group's mandate was strengthened by the Plenipotentiary Conference in 2006, emphasizing its role in facilitating membership input and providing guidance on WSIS implementation

Leadership: Chaired by South Africa, with Vice-Chairs from Azerbaijan, Brazil, Iraq, the Republic of Korea, Sweden, and Rwanda. This diverse leadership brings varied regional

perspectives to guide ITU's initiatives One of the core responsibilities of the CWG-WSIS&SDG is to monitor ITU's efforts in implementing the WSIS outcomes and advancing the SDGs. This includes reviewing reports from the Secretariat and providing recommendations to the Council to ensure alignment with global priorities

The group maintains ongoing engagement with ITU's membership through biannual meetings, circular letters, and questionnaires, ensuring that ITU's work reflects the collective views of its members



Call for Inputs on WSIS+20 Review

Council Resolution 1332, the chair of the Group invites members and stakeholders to contribute their views on the work of the ITU in the WSIS+20 review, incl. ideas related to the review of the WSIS Actions Lines

The call follows the process outlined in the resolution:

- Online Form: Launched in August 2024 for all stakeholders, with an extended deadline of 14 March 2025.
- 1st Physical Meeting: October 2024.
- 2nd Physical Meeting: February 2025.
- Side Event: Held during the WSIS+20 High-Level Event (7-11 July 2025

The process was designed to gather detailed insights into various aspects of the WSIS+20 review process, including achievements and challenges in implementing the Geneva Plan of Action, the alignment of the WSIS Process with the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, the constant evolution of the WSIS process to adapt to emerging trends, and the future of WSIS beyond 2025

A total of 96 submissions were received. Those who wish their contributions to be publicly shared can view them on the CWG-WSIS&SDG website

WSIS Achievements: Increased global connectivity, enhanced digital inclusion, and strengthened multistakeholder collaboration

Strengthening the WSIS Process to maintain the inclusive multistakeholder model: Maintaining open communication, adapting to emerging technologies, and strengthening partnerships across sectors

Emerging Digital Trends: AI, Green ICT, blockchain, Quantum Computing, IoT, and digital governance, among others developing regions

Challenges: Unequal ICT access, cyber threats, rapid technological changes, and funding issues for ICT projects in developing regions
